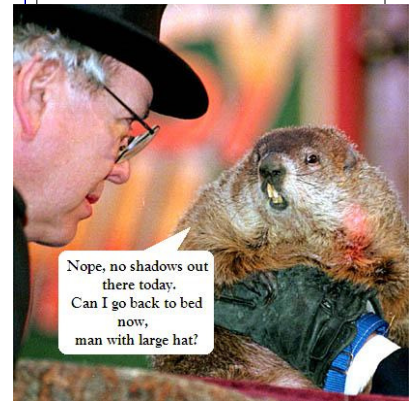

With the discussion of snow in this weekend's forecast I just wanted to send you some reminders:

About Work: Be sure that you do the homework (if any) that is due on the day of the snow day. Missing this work will cause a huge problem.

Avoid the urge to do all your homework for the week if we are closed for a long time, because I will have to modify the lesson plan and some work may be completed in class. What you should do is work on projects, memorizations, extra credit assignments, and book reports. These can be turned in early AND you get extra credit for it!

NEVER turn in any homework in early. It will be intertwined with other assignments and students will end up getting red slips for assignments completed already.

Nations Notebook

1. The students received information on Friday for their Nations Notebook project. We have begun the project in class and students have learned how to create their first bibliography card and start the first two pages of the booklet.
2. Students who received responses from their embassies have received their packets which are in their writing folders. They are to keep this information at school
3. The students who did not receive information from their embassies may go online to the embassy webpage and print information from the site to bring to school.
4. The rough draft packet and the final booklet stays at school until permission is given from Mrs. Todd. This will be based on individual progress of each student.
5. The student can use note cards to gather information outside of school.
6. All note taking **MUST** be the sole work of the student.
7. If students receive excessive help from the parent, they will lose 25 points from the interim date grade and the final grade if there is no remedy after the discovery has been made.
8. Students will receive a daily nations notebook response sheet to give their parents so that the parents are aware of their progress and any needs that the student needs from the parent.

Interim Dates for the Nations Notebook Project

Interim Dates are the dates when students have to show me what they've accomplished and to check in and conference with me.

Students are evaluated daily- and weekly.

Every weekly due date is a quiz grade. If they are not prepared they will lose points.

Daily evaluations will be given to students to give to parents daily. This is the communication between the student and the parent during the week concerning their project.

Parents will receive their evaluation sheets every day we work on the project and students will receive a grade every day based on what they did that day. If they wasted time, you will know and if they were diligent in getting their work accomplished, you will know that also.

6. Write out your commercial/ sales talk and hand it in with your T-shirt

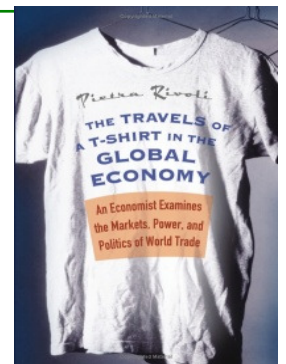

No Happy Endings?

Why Lemony Snicket isn't as bad as he claims

Books for kids are supposed to be **uplifting**. They're supposed to teach children valuable lessons. They're supposed to help kids learn how to get along in the world. They're supposed to have characters that set an example and above all to have happy endings.

Now along comes not just one, but a whole series of children's books that claims to do nothing of the sort. These books feature terrible things being done to children by terrible people. The author even promises that "...the book you are holding in your hands is extremely unpleasant. It tells an unhappy tale about three very unlucky children."

You probably know that the series in question is *A Series of Unfortunate Events*, written by a mysterious person named Lemony Snicket. You may even have seen the movie version of his first book, *A Bad Beginning*. There are now 11 of the books out of 13 promised. They have titles such as *The Miserable Mill* and *The Vile Village*. All of them follow the misadventures of the Baudelaire children, Violet, 14, Klaus, 12, and baby Sunny.

In the first chapter of the first book, the Baudelaires learn they are orphans. Their parents have **perished** in a terrible fire. They are sent to live with a distant relative, Count Olaf, who is not only strange, but also clearly evil. The children have been left a huge fortune, and Olaf schemes to get his hands on it.

Role Models?

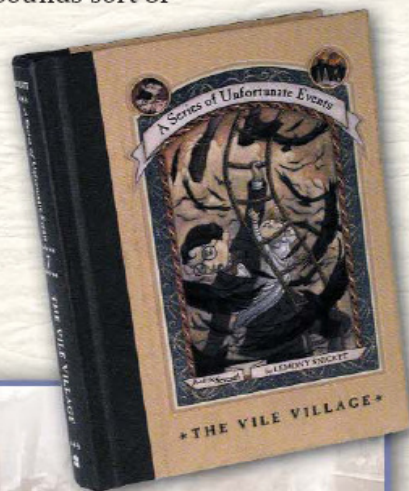
Violet, Klaus, and Sunny are very unlucky, just as the author promises. Yet somehow they manage to escape from every plot hatched against them. They do this with no help from grown-ups, who never believe the children when they try to get help. No, the Baudelaire kids are forced to rely on themselves.

Sunny, Violet, and Klaus win out over nasty adults. Watch out for Sunny, though. She bites!

They each have a talent. Violet is great at inventing gadgets. Klaus is an expert at research. And Sunny? Well, Sunny is good at biting things really, really hard. With their combined skills and a little luck, the three children always manage to scrape by, no matter what evil adults try to do to them. Somehow, the Baudelaires have managed to survive through 11 books.

The Lemony Snicket series is popular because it's original, it's fun, and it avoids the traps of "goody-goody" children's literature. It's not **sentimental**, and it pits the young heroes against the adult world. But is it really a series of unhappy tales? Not really. In his own sneaky way, Lemony Snicket has come up with kid heroes who stick together, never give up, and win out over the odds every time. Sounds sort of uplifting, right?

In fact, it almost sounds like the sort of book that's good for you. But don't worry, we won't tell anyone if you won't.

Understanding the Criteria for Review Writing

Reader's Response

Be the Writer

Think of a book you especially enjoyed. Why did you like it so much? Were its characters inspiring or realistic? Did the action have you on the edge of your seat? Did it make you think about new issues? Write a review of the book, evaluating its strengths. Tell just enough about it to interest readers without giving too much of the plot or ending away.

From the Writer

You have just finished a book—it is your new favorite! You can't wait to recommend it to someone. A book review is an excellent way to tell people your reaction to a book and help them decide if they want to read it. What should your review contain?

First, you should write an introduction that grabs attention and gives some basic information. In the review "No Happy Endings?" the author "hooks" readers by telling them the books to be reviewed are not good for them. He goes on to summarize what the series is about and very briefly introduces the main characters. By this time, readers are quite curious about what happens to the orphaned main characters.

Next, your book review should move to a discussion of elements such as character, plot, or setting in order to show why and how the author succeeds in writing a great book. This reviewer focuses on action and character, explaining how the author has created self-reliant, resourceful characters who manage to survive repeated evil attacks against them. He states that the series is original, fun, and refreshingly hard-edged.

Conclude your review with a restatement of the point readers should understand. For the Lemony Snicket series, that point is that the characters are appealing, original, and also good role models.

Quarter 3 Extra Credit! Science, History, Math and Spelling:

Current Events:

Based on p. 207 in your Science Book, Create a current event notebook:

Identify current events that involve changes in ecosystems.

Procedure:

1. Look through newspapers and news magazines and cut out any articles that are about an ecosystem. Listen to news reports, if you hear one about an ecosystem, record the date and time of the report and write a brief description about what was said
2. Organize your articles and information into a notebook. (use a binder or a folder with tabs). Arrange the notebook in a logical way. You might want to group your news reports by topic, type of event, date, or geographical location. Be sure to include a table of contents in your notebook.

This notebook will be graded for both Science and History. Part of your grade will be to present your information on the ecosystems.

Math Extra Credit:

P. 344 in your math book– The word problems in the supplementary exercises section. Be sure that you do your work on a separate sheet of paper. You need to get a 85% or above on the word problems to get full extra credit.

Spelling List: In order to get full extra credit: you must get an 85% or better on the extra credit test on 2/18. Remember, if you did not fill out the form and turn it in by 2/18, no extra credit will be given.
