

### Stress Alert Project!



Congratulations! You have been chosen to be a reporter for your favorite news program. You have been asked to shoot on location near where a storm or disaster is taking place. Using p. 206 in Your Science Text book and p. 122 in your Science Activity Manual:

- 1. Choose your topic. Parents: students have no control over which topic they will receive. They will draw their topics 2/24/10
- 2. Research and record your information on your chosen topic on page 122 in your activity manual. Remember: reporters must answer the questions: who, what, when, where, why and how.
- 3. From the information that you've gathered and placed in your activity manual, organize your material into a news report for the evening news. Be creative! You may video your project if you choose. Bring in props or logos for your favorite news channel.
- 4. Don't go overboard! This is not a 30 minute news cast! You have only 2- 5 minutes to present. Don't get so caught up in the details of the presentation that you do not turn in a good product. This is a Science, History and Language Grade!
- 5. What you will turn in on 3/11/10:
- ⇒ a copy of your news report (so make sure you have 2– one for you to use and one for me to grade)
- ⇒ Your activity manual
- ⇒ Any CD's/DVD's that you've created to view.
- ⇒ Students DO NOT HAVE TO VIDEO TAPE THEIR NEWS
  PROGRAM. They can "shoot" their News show live, in the
  classroom. If you are planning to "shoot" live, <u>Do not bring</u>
  your props etc. until the day that you are presenting—
  which you will receive on 3/11 and will be listed on the Tickler.
- 6. Parents **AVOID** the urge to help too much. You are not doing your child **ANY** favors. You actually **HURT** their grade when you are overly helpful!!!!!

Students will have time to work on their research in class after the during the week leading up to the due date. They must bring materials in class for them to work on.

Reminder: Project due Thursday March 11. Students will present on varying days. If the student is unprepared to present, their grade will be deducted.





# The Medieval Feast

During the Middle Ages the people ate only the foods that grew on the manor grounds or could be found in the nearby forests. The lack of safe transportation limited the variety of foods.

Peasants ate whatever they could grow or catch. Herbs and spices were used to disguise the taste of old meat.

The meal in the castle was another matter. Peasants planted vegetables including carrots, lettuce, okra, onions, potatoes, spinach, and squash. In the fields grains were raised such as barley, oats, rye, and wheat. These grains were ground into flour to use in breads and cakes. The peasants also harvested a number of fruits including grapes, cherries, plums, and crab apples. Nuts were also a favorite.

The only meat that was eaten was what could be hunted in the manor forests. The meat was heavily salted or smoked to keep it from spoiling. The most common meats were beef, venison, some fresh fish, and a variety of fowl including chickens, partridges, peafowl, and pigeons. Some pork was eaten although it was usually tough.

Honey was used as a sweetener. Honey was used in the making of cakes and pastries.

Favorite drinks included wine, verjuice, and mead. Verjuice was a sour juice made from crab apples or unripe grapes. It tasted much like cider. Mead was a fermented drink made from water, honey, malt, and yeast.

Only the wealthy lords used goblets and plates made from gold, silver, or pewter. The less important guests were served on wooden platters called trenchers or with wooden goblets. These were often shared by two people. At times the trenchers were made from bread.

Keeping this in mind, these are the types of things that we will have for our medieval feast. Please return bottom portion by Thursday March 11, 2010. The feast is Wednesday March 24 at lunch time. Don't forget to dress up as a medieval character
